- What is the EU's approach to waste management? (Hints: prevention, preparation for re-use, recycling, energy recovery, disposal, etc.)
- How does the EU enforce the waste reduction target among its twenty-eight member states?
- Hong Kong Government published a consultation document in early 2012 to suggest introducing "Municipal Solid Waste Charging" as a means to reduce the generation of solid waste. To what extent do you think this policy would be effective?
- It is said that Hong Kong has an imminent waste problem. What do you think are the major causes of the waste problem in Hong Kong? (Hints: Low environmental awareness, rapid economic development, etc.)
- "Incineration of waste is a double-edged sword<sup>2</sup> to the Hong Kong community".
  Do you agree with this statement? Why?

# <u>Suggested examples for enquiry provided by the Resource Package</u> (Resource Package P.105)

■ Public consultation on Municipal Solid Waste Charging: The Government published a consultation document in early 2012 to suggest introducing "Municipal Solid Waste Charging" as an economic means to reduce the generation of solid waste. Teachers may consider guiding students to study the extent to which the policy would be effective in reducing solid waste, and its impact on the citizens if it is to be implemented.

# Relevant or comparable examples for enquiry

- Landfilling in European countries: While Hong Kong's landfills are likely to be expanded, several European countries such as Austria, Belgium, Germany, Denmark and Sweden have imposed a restricted or complete ban on landfilling. Not more than 3% of waste ends up in landfills in these countries. The rest gets incinerated, recycled or composted. (Eurostat, the statistical office of the European Union. (2013 March 4).
